Strategies for Managing Student Behaviour

The following is a review of the various strategies implemented throughout the year with the addition of some 4th Quarter strategies

- Implementation of 'Better Behaviour Better Learning Program'.
- Continue to encourage teachers and teacher aides to be 'Profiled' and critically reflect on, and develop, behaviour management strategies that a re conducive to creating a positive and supportive classroom/school environment.
- Continue to implement and strengthen You Can Do It! Program through student, parent and community engagement
- Celebrate positive student behaviour through the provision of extrinsic rewards

- Align protocols for managing student behaviour with the Western Cape College 'Code of Student Behaviour' to ensure continuity across the 3 Campuses.
- Develop and manage the 'Little Greenies Garden Club' during lunch hours. This program sees students
 working together to maintain the grounds and gardens of the school Campus. This program has
 reduced the amount of 'bullying' behaviours that develop due to boredom at lunch times. This program
 will also serve to help students take ownership of their school.
- Work with the Sport and Recreation Officer to offer games and activities during lunch times and use this
 opportunity to develop good teamwork and leadership skills.
- Continue to implement the 'Responsible Behaviour Plan' developed by Western Cape College and develop 'Behaviour Plans' for students when necessary.
- Deliver You Can Do It! Sessions to students to explicitly teach getting along, persistence, resilience and confidence skills.
- Deliver 'Protective Behaviours Program' to all students from P 6. This program provides children with the skills to stop unwanted behaviour from others.
- Develop Individual Behaviour Plans for identified students
- Individual Parent Meetings, where necessary, to discuss student behaviour
- Develop and display new 'School Rules'
- Request Specialist support for assisting students identified as having behaviour difficulties
- Provide professional development for staff in the 'Micro-skills for Managing Classroom Behaviour'
- Discuss Behaviour Management strategies at weekly Staff Meetings to share best practice and develop strategies
- Individual student 'Behaviour Programs' for identified students
