Last week the National 3, 5, 7 and 9 Tests were held for the first time. These tests were held on May the 13^{th} , 14^{th} and 15^{th} and are used for students, parents and teachers to measure how the students at Western Cape College are performing on key Literacy and Numeracy benchmarks compared to other students across the Country. As I always highlight, these tests are just a point in time measure and results need to be considered in conjunction with individual student reports,

which measure a range of learning and achievements. The tests were run successfully across each of our Campuses and I look forward to reporting the results when finalised. If you have any concerns about these tests or how your child is going at school I encourage you to talk to your child's teacher. The Weipa Hostel consultations are steadily progressing; a Steering Committee has officially been established with a range of stakeholder groups represented. A number of frequently asked questions have been identified during the consultations and these have been addressed specifically in this edition. The development of the new Hostel will be a welcome addition for the Cape York community and is essential for our surrounding communities children to have additional access options for secondary schooling. Finally, I draw your attention to the Weipa Community Quarterly Report for the 2008 first quarter. The Mapoon and Aurukun reports have been published previously. These reports form part of the Western Cape College commitment to the Bound for Success Education Strategy and the accountabilities and responsibilities the College has adopted within this strategy. Staff: 13 teachers, 9 teacher-aides, Oral-Language Teacher, Reading Recovery Teacher, Year 3 Support Teacher and specialist staff. Facilities:

- 2 specialist classrooms being utilised for music and student support.
- Repaired and replaced water bubblers.

Fencing and general repairs continuing. Curriculum:

- Term One School Based Tasks completed teachers to moderate the assessment items for semester one reports. All tasks were based on Positive Behaviours, classroom rules and the You Can Do It Program Achieve.
- Implementation of the Oral Language Program in years one and two
- Successful Parent Teacher Interviews.
- Parent Information nights, well attended.
- Year three teachers are incorporating their two Moderated Tasks, 'Endangered Species' and 'Craft' tasks into their weekly Science, Art & Research lessons in Preparation for semester two. Their main focus this term is the 'Narrative' genre, an aspect of the Year 3 Test and general test preparation
- Year two teachers are immersing students in the 'Procedural' genre through the Making of Puppets in preparation of the Year 2 Diagnostic Net and the Validation Process which occurs from Monday 19 May to Friday 13 June. Year one teachers are introducing the necessary vocabulary for students to understand the same but different concept for their moderated task.

Middle School: Year 4-6

- Term 1 demonstrated a successful transition for our Year 4 and 5 students from Western side of Campus to Eastern side classrooms and facilities.
- Our Middle School Leadership structure has been implemented and elected with 2 Middle School Leaders, 12 House Captains and 18 Student Council representatives and proxies esenting our students across Years 4 to 6. Duties and meeting structure are in place and will continue to roll out into Term 2.

Attendance



New Weipa Hostel FAQs

Why should we have a new hostel in Weipa?

Recent years have seen the College expand in size, particularly at the Weipa Campus. The Weipa Campus is the only P-12 education facility in Cape York. Therefore, Weipa is the only site to meet the needs of secondary school students requiring additional boarding options within reasonable reach of home communities. Weipa Campus has the capacity to meet these students' educational needs to ensure all students in Cape York can achieve success. Providing a boarding facility with increased capacity for the students of Cape York will increase education outcomes, as evidenced by increased attendance, retention and completion rates of current boarding students. The current Hostel, although under a successful management team is inadequate to cope with current student numbers and future projections in student population growth in the Cape region to ensure a continued level of service provision. Finally, it is illegal for students not to be enrolled and attending school until the age of 17, therefore these options need to be available to students who are unable to access these options in home communities.

Who can attend the new Hostel?

Students in years 8-12 from the Cape York communities of Aurukun, Coen, Mapoon, Lockhart, Kowanyama, and Pormpuraaw will be attending the new Hostel. Students from these communities will consist of Indigenous and non-Indigenous students who have decided with their families that the Weipa facility is their choice to access secondary schooling. Student intake from each community will be proportionate to the student population requiring access to secondary schooling options.

What will students have to be eligible for boarding at the Weipa Hostel?

Traditionally, the criteria for admittance to the Weipa Hostel considers student attendance, behaviour, educational outcomes. Additionally, students need to demonstrate a positive attitude to their learning. These factors will ensure those quality students are given the chance to further their education and achieve good outcomes. One of the main hostel goals will be to create a hub for learning excellence within the Cape region. Schools Maintenance Program

There has been recent media interest in the budget of the Schools Maintenance Program which manages the upgrading and upkeep of Queensland's state schools. In Queensland state schools the health, safety and security of staff and students is always our top priority and it is no different when it comes to urgent maintenance needs. Each year, qualified QBuild staff inspect every one of Queensland's 1251 state schools and identify and prioritise any maintenance work which needs to be undertaken. To ensure healthy working and learning environments, the State Government is investing \$84 million in school maintenance in 2007-08. This funding is on top of a \$445.5 million capital works program, which builds new schools and new classrooms for Queensland's growing population.
