Education Outcomes

Junior School:

Successful Preparatory Year of Schooling:

- The first 35 Weipa Prep students graduating into year 1

- Students assessed in their ability to recognise numbers in order to 10, basic shapes, opposite concept, counting orally, basic colours, lower case and capital letters and letter sounds.
- Successful Transition program from Pre-Prep to Prep.
- Informative Parent Information night, well attended.
- Covered walkway to the toilets completed.
- 3 Prep classes for 2008 approx. 60 enrolments to date.

Junior School Curriculum:

- Bound for Success Moderated Task for years 1, 2 and 3 implemented and moderated.
- Curriculum Assessment and Reporting Document created for each year level for 2008.
- Report Cards, Year 2 NET results and Year 3 Test results posted to families.

Other:

- Covered walkway to year 1 & 2 eating area.
- New handball and hopscotch courts painted.

Middle School:

Year 4-6

Term 4 saw an improvement in student behaviour with reduced MSB's and an implementation of the "Responsible Behaviour" Incentive Program.

Year 4,5,6 Teachers successfully moderated their District Moderated Tasks in Week 6.

Year 4 Push and Shove my way through texts (Creating Bullying strategies)

Year 5 KFC- Kohlrabi, Figs and Cumquats (Focus on healthy eating/nutrition)

Year 6 Away with words (Creating/reviewing text for emergent reader)

The ordering of the Year 4,5,6 Playground is completed, with Investing in Schools funded confirmed and company "Big Splash" estimating completion of the new play environment to be mid 2008.

Implementation of Transition Strategy was successful, with Leon Proud and David Foxover visiting Mapoon for an information session. Year 3,4,5,6 students completed activities where

they had opportunities to observe work done in next years grade, as well as have lunch in their new areas. Year 6 students participated in a leadership camp which built on relationships as they transition into Year 7.

Preparation of Student "At Risk" Program was initiated, with a Year 5 group of "at risk" students undertaking a music program at lunchtimes. In 2008 this will be rolled out.

Teachers have started implementation of the ILP Diagnostic Maps for each student. Teachers focused on the reading strand and will address all 5 maps in 2008.

Year 7-9 Middle School Report Term 4 2007

The students completed their final District Moderated Tasks in each year level.

Year 8 – Soap Operas

Year 9 - Personal Career Development Plan.

The moderation process was successful and some of the samples were sent to Cairns for further moderation.

The Handball courts were painted by the Senior boys. These are located near the toilets, between W and V blocks and outside V01. The Middle school students have been using them in their lunch times. Mr Proud organised a Handball competition which saw 2 Year 8 students win overall.

The Middle School Leaders for 2008 have been elected and they are – Reece Sainsbury, Mikey Carter, Shani Wallin and Stevie Barham. The other students who nominated were all of a high standard.

Senior School

Term 4 saw 32 year 12's graduate from Western Cape College Weipa Campus. The seniors led several key events this term starting with Presentation Night and finishing with the Senior Formal. These events were a great success with the students being truly recognised for there efforts throughout the year. On the final day of school for the year twelves, there was a morning tea provided for the parents, staff and year 11's to farewell the year 12's. They were given a guard of honour as they left the grounds for the last time. They were a fantastic group of students.

SAT's

SAT's are winding up for the year with most of the students in year 12 being successful in completing their certificates. Many of the students have already transitioned into full time work, which is the aim of the program. Rio Tinto have already offered several more SAT's for 2008.

Work Experience

The Year 10 and 11 students have just completed a week's work experience. Eight students were given the opportunity to go to Sydney to work with Sunrise, channel V and Dolly magazine. The success of this trip could be seen in the excitement in the kids faces with two of the students actually appearing on Sunrise. Another group of students went to Cairns to further there career options that otherwise couldn't be catered for in Weipa. This was also a success with several students given the option of further training opportunities. The college must also

acknowledge the commitment from the local industry in providing for the majority of students with excellent industry experience.

SETPlan's

At this stage of the year, all the focus for SETplans goes towards the Service Guarantee. We are extremely confident of achieving 100% of students into a positive pathway and aim to extend our support structure for two years post schooling. Many of the year twelves have already been successful in securing full time employment and we wait with baited breath for the OP scores to come out.
